The UCSLD invests in professional development to build the capacity of boards of directors, boards of trustees and all UCSLD and public libraries' staff members

- Continuation of cataloging training and support
- Ongoing library staff in-service trainings provided the first Zoom training in 4/2020
- Planned for a library Board in-service training and this did not receive interest so was canceled. Will look at other options for Board trainings.

The UCSLD operated efficiently, effectively and within the laws of the State of Oregon and the approved policies of the UCSLD Board of Directors

- Continuation of digitization of UCSLD documents
- Staff developed a records management structure and are working to implement
- Redundancy built into administrative tasks
- The new Take Off! car was not purchased in 2019, but was moved to 2020/21 budget year
- The Board reviewed and updated many policies
- The office was moved to allow for a more usable space
- Applied for and received a Ford Family Foundation grant to cover costs associated with the tax distribution review process
- Contracted with Ruth Metz Associates to provide facilitation of the tax distribution review process

1 HOW DOES THE UCSLD LEVERAGE TAX DOLLARS TO ENSURE THE CONTINUATION OF EXCELLENT, GROWING LIBRARY SERVICES WITHIN THE DISTRICT

The UCSLD operated well during a year of much upheaval and chaos. We had big things on the docket — tax distribution review, move of the office — and between weather, pandemic and the adjustment to new ways of doing things, we continued to function well.





The UCSLD supports libraries' outreach efforts, helping to provide accessible services to populations where they are.

- The Take Off! Program had to completely shift and flex
- Partnerships with the libraries continued but in a different way

The UCSLD directly provides early childhood literacy outreach to children in Umatilla County

- Take Off! has a robust FaceBook, new YouTube station and Pinterest community
- · Partnerships with Early childhood educators were kept strong
- The collection development policy was written in the FY20-21
- There has been extensive work done on the Take Off! Collection

2 HOW DO POPULATIONS IN UMATILLA COUNTY ACCESS LIBRARY SERVICES?

Take Off!

- 427 Storytimes
- 1,998 gift books given to children
- 16,956 books were rotated in the wonderful book boxes



Residents of the UCSLD have access to centralized and increased communication avenues to increase their ability to participate in the services offered by the libraries.

- Strategic plans continue to be updated
- Gale database pages provided for each library and can be accessed from the UCSLD site with each libraries' patron card numbers.
- Early documents of the UCSLD are digitized
- The East Oregonian column Libraries Provide Countywide is created and published each month.

Library staff members have access to the information and support they need in order to reach more people with the library's message.

- The UCSLD website continues to provide information of district events, projects and opportunities
- Instead of a SharePoint site, a Google drive was set up for library staff in the UCSLD to share information

3 HOW DO MORE PEOPLE LEARN ABOUT WHAT SERVICES THE UCSLD AND MEMBER LIBRARIES OFFER?

Marketing continues to be a need for all libraries. We have made progress with the EO column and an updated website.

We provide access to shared documents, Zoom meetings, storytime kits and support on anything asked of us.
